10 Ways to Protect your Watershed

For most of us, the water at home comes from a municipal tap, so it's easy to forget how much the quality of a community's watershed affects water quality and the people, wildlife, and plants that depend on that water. Well-managed watersheds serve as recreational magnets for humans and critical habitat for wildlife, but they also reduce flooding, making your home safer and reducing insurance costs. You have much more control over what happens to the water on your own property. Here are ways you can preserve and protect local watersheds:

1. Plant a rain garden. Excess runoff can cause flooding and stream-bank erosion during rainstorms. Creating a rain garden with native grasses, trees, and shrubs gives runoff from your home's downspouts a chance to soak naturally into the ground. Add a rain barrel to save water for later use.
2. Limit fertilizer. If you must fertilize your lawn, choose a product without phosphorous, which along with nitrogen, upsets the balance of nutrients in local waterways.
3. Service your septic system every three years. Failing septics send "plumes" of nitrogen, phosphorous, and bacteria to nearby streams and shores.
4. Avoid pesticides. Though most pesticides break down in soil, a storm can wash them into nearby streams. Instead, explore biological pest control methods such as species-specific bacteria, predator stocking (think ladybugs), and pheromone lures, which attract and trap pests.
5. Pick up pet waste. In a 20-square-mile watershed draining to a small coastal bay, two to three days of droppings from a 100 dogs would contribute enough E.coli bacteria to temporarily close the bay to swimming.
6. Buffer streams. If you have a stream on your property, provide a natural buffer of native trees, shrubs, and plants around its banks to filter dirty storm water runoff.
7. Use commercial car washes. The best place to wash your car is at a commercial car wash, many of which filter their water before directing it to treatment plants. If you must wash your vehicle at home, park it on the grass first, so your lawn absorbs some of the detergent runoff and contaminants.
8. Avoid paving. If you must pave, consider stone pavers for a patio, rather than concrete, and gravel for a driveway, rather than asphalt.

In short, it can be easy and tempting to think of watershed stewardship as someone else's problem. But the responsibility for our most precious resource begins right at home.

Motion was made by Norman Schippert and seconded by Henry Walser for Introduction and First Reading of the Ordinance Adopting a Sup-





BOONE SOCIETY

Take Part in annual Long Run Massacre on Saturday, September 8, 2018 at Red Orchard Park, Shelbyville, KY.

Known as an organization that is dedicated to preserving the Boone family name, members of The Boone Society will make a trip to Shelbyville on Saturday, September 8 to participate in this year's Long Run Massacre & Floyd's Defeat. This event is dedicated to the memory of Shelbyville's connection to the Boone family, Squire Boone, along with the individuals who briefly lived at Painted Stone Station.

Each year a living history re-enactment is held by the Painted Stone Settlers, Inc. to depict the story of Squire Boone's Station in the year 1781. Included are demonstrations of forgotten heritage skills such as spinning, weaving, blacksmithing and fire starting, in addition to a Native American camp, Kentucky authors and the Isaac Shelby Chapter of the SAR.

Many descendants of those first settlers living at Painted Stone Station return each year. Last year a large presence of Low Dutch descendants visited the re-enactment to get a sense of the history that their ancestors lived through. This year, The Boone Society will be there to distribute information and answer questions.


