SEPTIC SYSTEM FAILURES

Pouring household and home improvement chemicals down your drains, flushing garbage down toilets, excessive water use, and failure to provide proper maintenance aren't the only culprits for septic system failure. Take note of these additional causes of septic failure:

Hot tubs

Hot tubs may be a great way to relax, but when it comes to emptying them, your septic system should avoided. Emptying a hot tub into your septic system stirs the solids in the tank, pushing them into the drainfield, causing it to clog and fail.

Drain cooled hot tub water onto turf or landscaped areas far away from your septic tank and drainfield, and in accordance with local regulations. Use the same caution when draining swimming pools.

Water purification and softening systems

Some freshwater purification systems, including water softeners, unnecessarily pump water into septic systems. Such systems can send hundreds of gallons of water to septic tanks, causing agitation of solids and excess flow to drainfields. When researching water purification and softening systems, check with a licensed plumbing professional about alternative routing for such treatment systems.

Garbage disposals

Consider eliminating or limit the use of garbage disposals. While convenient, frequent use of garbage disposals significantly increases the accumulation of sludge and scum in septic tanks, resulting in the need for more frequent pumping.

Improper design or installation

The proper design and installation of a septic system is essential for it to correctly function. A home's groundwater table, soil composition, and a properly leveled drainfield are just a few factors to ensure a well-functioning septic system. Be sure to do your research when hiring septic professionals.

Failure symptoms: Mind the signs!

A foul odor isn't always the first sign of a malfunctioning septic system. Call a septic professional if you notice any of the following:

- Wastewater backing up into household drains.
- Bright green, spongy grass on the drainfield, even during dry weather.
- Pooling water or muddy soil around your septic system or in your basement.
- A strong odor around the septic tank and drainfield.

Mind the signs of a failing system. One call to a septic professional could save you thousands of dollars!

The regular meeting of the City Council of Pewee Valley, Kentucky was held on Monday, January 4, 2016. In attendance were Mayor Bob Rogers, Council Members Henry Walser, Rex Florence, Norman Schippert, Bethany Major, and Dick Filippini. Also in attendance were John Singler, City Attorney and Laura Eichenberger, City Clerk.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The Profit & Loss vs. Actual, and Balance Sheet through January 2, 2016 reports from the Treasurer were distributed in the Council Member meeting packets.

OPEN COMMENTS

Carolyn Smither, CASA Director, presented a plaque to the City of Pewee Valley, thanking the community for hosting the annual CASA Super Hero 5K Run on Halloween morning. Throughout the year, Pewee Valley residents have donated food, clothing, coats, hats, and bicycles to children in crisis.


Rex Florence (Finance/Insurance/Storm Water): No report.

Mayor Rogers stated the City is reserving a booth for the 2016 Oldham County Day, Saturday, July 16, 2016. Volunteers are needed for the booth. Bethany Major and Norman Schippert agreed to volunteer.

Bob Rogers (Roads & Drainage/Tree Board): Mayor Rogers reported after the heavy amount of rain last week, Town Hall did not flood. The City has plenty of salt for any ice and snow weather for the season.

Tracey Williams (Environmental Board): No report.



OLD BUSINESS

Sign Permit Application: Herdt Motor "Coca Cola" sign: Following discussion and further review of the permit application last month, John Singler determined that the "Coca Cola" sign falls under the Oldham County Outdoor Sales Area section of the land development code. A City sign permit is not necessary.

NEW BUSINESS

Included in the Council's packet is a list of roads in Pewee Valley that LG&E will be performing pole replacement, tree trimming, and maintenance. The timeframe of the work has not yet been determined.

Discussion Regarding Alcohol Sales In Oldham County and How It Pertains to Pewee Valley: Mayor Rogers stated the election for alcohol sales in Oldham County passed. Out of the 47,862 registered Oldham County voters, about 12% voted. In the Pewee Valley precinct, 142 voted in favor and 89 against.

He has already received an inquiry about selling alcohol in the City. City Attorney, John Singler is looking into what can be done. The





property in question is already zoned allowing for liquor sales.

The County will appoint a board to grant liquor licenses and locations. Control for Alcohol Beverage Control (ABC) regulations is the local administrator, who by default, is the County Judge Executive.

John Singler stated that Pewee Valley may not have enough population to have its own local administrator, which would allow the City to regulate alcohol sales through appropriate ordinance.

John Singler will further research the issue and discussion will continue at the February 1st Council Meeting.

OPEN COMMENTS

There was no response to the call for open comments.

Upon approval of payment of outstanding bills, the Council voted unanimously to adjourn.
